



Kent Lee Dillingham

December 7, 1956 - April 6, 2018

Kent Dillingham passed away in Owasso, OK on April 6, 2018 at the age of 61. Kent was born in Tulsa, Ok on December 7, 1956 to Charles and Betty Smith (Rider). He received his public education in Bartlesville, OK attending College High and graduating from high school at the Army Navy Academy in Carlsbad, CA.

After graduation, he joined the Marines in 1974, then transferred to the Navy in 1979. Upon completion of his training, Kent became a Navy SEAL, graduating at the top of his class. While in the service of his country, he received 7 bronze stars, 3 gold stars, marksman, sharpshooter and combat swimmer awards, and multiple good conduct, commendation and service medals, awards, and ribbons. Kent retired with 30 years of military service in 2004 ranked Senior Chief Petty Officer.

He leaves behind his wife Leah, of the home, son Jason Hood River, OR, son Morgan Panama City Beach, FL, daughter April Hand Panama City Beach, FL, mother Betty Dillingham Owasso, OK, sister Sherry Whisler and Ed, Claremore, OK, stepsister Linda Curtis, Cushing, OK, 5 grandchildren and many nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.

He was preceded in death by his father Charles H. Smith, Jr., brother Vance D. Smith, stepfather Syd W. Dillingham, and stepbrother Fred D. Dillingham.
